It is a challenge to write curriculum that will appeal to junior and senior high school ages, that will work in Sunday School classes and youth group meetings, and that will provide tools for teaching a few or large youth groups. We have done our best to write lessons packed with a variety of teaching tools and methods; therefore, you can choose those that are most fitting for your participants, and according to your time constraints. The youth curriculum follows the same outline as the adult material and is written in order with our Faith and Practice. However, each lesson can also stand alone and does not build on previous lessons.

#### **Scripture Verses and Quaker Quotes:**

- o Scripture is taken from a variety of versions.
- Consider reading verses and quotes at the beginning and end of each lesson in order to tie everything together.
- Have students memorize scripture passages or Quaker quotes and earn prizes and certificates for memorizing them each week.

#### Skits & Visitors:

- o Some scripts can be performed on the spot during the lesson.
- o Several will need preparation or a little rehearsal.
- o Consider performing one for the entire meeting.
- o Be creative with costuming and props. This will build more excitement and interest in the group.
- Invite others from your Meeting to share as visitors, involving other generations in your study.
- Assist your group in connecting the values demonstrated by the lives of the Quaker visitors to our lives today.

# I Have Called You Friends: Early Quaker History

I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. John 15:15 (NIV)

### **Opening Icebreaker: All Sorts**

Get the group to move around the room, finding others with shared interests and preferences. Yell out two contrasting choices and have the group to move either east or west of the room (e.g. "Do you prefer Target or Wal-Mart). Throw out two more choices and have them move north or south. Sorts that work well include: movie/book; salty/sweet; DVD/cinema; jeans/sweats; inside/outside; on stage/in audience, etc.

# Skit: 8 Easy Points of Quaker History

Summary - Creative way for introducing key names within the Quaker movement: George Fox, Margaret Fell, Elizabeth Harris, and William Penn. Includes some key events of Quakers to America: Quietism, Revival, birth of the Richmond Declaration, and Friends umbrella organizations.

This will work best if the teacher and students participating in the skit have already practiced the skit. It is also recommended that the students perform this skit for the entire meeting to remind the adults of our Quaker history.

<u>CAST</u>: Minimum of 9 actors, Maximum of 15 (Skit Script Follows Lesson Plan)

# **Activity: Frame Stop**

Make copies of the Frame Stop hand-out and/or use it as a power point. Review our Quaker history by examining your own personal history of faith and tuning in on your spiritual journey. Take time to name someone for each frame or list descriptions of those people who have impacted those steps in your spiritual journey. Those reviewed include: GEORGE FOX - Who has been one to ask those challenging questions that push you to experience a relationship with Christ that is alive, passionate, and personal? CHILDREN OF LIGHT - Who are you walking with in your spiritual search for Truth? Example: Family, Friends, Church Connections. MESSENGER - Who has been a witness to you? They are living out their faith. Their dedication and faithfulness challenge you to walk closer to the Lord. Who has stood firm in their faith? **DEFENDER** - Look at your faith. Have you searched for what you truly believe? Have you been a seeker in your faith? Can you defend vour faith as Fox did with the doctor? Do you know what you believe?

Is our faith based on rules of the existing church order, or is our faith alive, real, and personal?


What do we believe? Who will we be? Allow time for silence and sharing.

#### THE SKIT:

#### The Narrator:

Welcome to a skit of eight oversimplified points of the creation and divisions in Quaker history. A lot of important things have been left out, including awesome influences Quakers have had in the world concerning the abolition of slavery, the promotion of women's rights, service & peace work. For example, did you know that the American Friends Service Committee won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1947?

## 1. George Fox and the beginnings of Quakerism:

**The Narrator**: #1. Once upon a time (in 1640's England), a young man named George Fox was unsatisfied with his life.

While the narrator is talking George Fox, wearing leather britches and shaggy shaggy locks, wanders about the stage. Fox is singing from the George Fox song:

**Fox:** "In my old leather britches and my shaggy, shaggy locks, I'm not yet walking in the glory of the Light"

The Narrator: "Said Fox."

Fox first meets up with snooty people wearing white shirts with whom he mimes conversation. Fox begins looking very hopeful but quickly becomes sad and goes on looking more and more disappointed as time goes on.

**The Narrator**: Fox had a leading, that life had more to offer him than met the eye. When he was 19 years old, he started off walking around the south of England, asking questions. He met with lots of educated religious men. He wasn't impressed. They just didn't seem to truly be men of God and they could not answer his questions. He was depressed. When Fox was 22, he went wandering again, this time to the north.

Fox then comes upon a group of people wearing Quaker shirts. He looks overjoyed.

This time Fox met some people like him. Fox began working out for himself what it meant to be a Christian. He had an epiphany. Anybody know what that vocabulary word means?

**Fox**: "When all my hopes were gone, so that I had nothing outwardly to help me, nor could tell what to do, then, oh then, I heard a voice which said,

An invisible Voice of God from offstage (or hiding behind narrator): 'There is one, even Christ Jesus, that can speak to thy condition,'

Fox: and when I heard it my heart did leap for joy."

**The Narrator**: Fox kept wandering around. He met up with some seekers who were already having meetings for worship where anyone could preach.

Margaret Fell enters and mimes speaking with Fox

**The Narrator**: Soon Fox met Margaret Fell, a strong supporter who would eventually become his wife. Margaret was a very important ally. She helped Fox form the structures to carry on the Quaker movement. Out of fear, the British government altered laws to prevent groups from meeting in case they might be conspiring against the government. Because they would not swear in court or take off their hats to nobility, the Quakers were always getting thrown in jail. Between traveling in the ministry and being jailed, Margaret and George were hardly ever in the same place.

During this a police officer drags Fox and Fell in front of a Judge, who orders them jailed. They are removed from the stage.

The Narrator: But they didn't give up.

#### 2. Quakers come to America:

The Narrator: #2. In 1655, Elizabeth Harris was the first Quaker to come to the new world. Others followed her, both as missionaries and in search of a home free of the religious persecution Quakers faced in Britain. Of course, there was plenty of persecution in the colonies as well, including being thrown in jail, and in a few cases, killed. In 1681, 37-year-old William Penn,

Penn appears on stage

**The Narrator**: . . .a Quaker who was the son of a British navel officer, accepted an enormous tract of land in America as settlement of a debt owed to his father by King Charles II. Penn founded Pennsylvania on Quaker principles. He encouraged the colonists to pay Native Americans for the land they were taking from them, and to generally treat them well.

**Penn**: "We are too ready to retaliate, rather than forgive, or gain by love and information. And yet we could hurt no man that we believe loves us. Let us then try what Love will do: for if men did once see we love them, we should soon find they would not harm us. Force may subdue, but Love gains: and he that forgives first, wins the laurel."

Penn exits

#### 3. Quietism (1682-1776): (Walk across stage with Sign)

**The Narrator**: #3. By 1700, the original Quaker leaders were pretty much all dead. The third generation of Quakers was in charge. They became fearful of the negative and sinful influences of the larger society, so they begin to withdraw inward. There was much less spoken ministry in Meeting for Worship. There were more and more rules that could get you disowned from the meeting.

A row of sad people stand on stage in a line. One at a time they confess, as though in AA, what horrible thing they did to get kicked out of meeting:

**Confessor** #1: I was written out of meeting for flamboyant attire. It was just a tail of my purple scarf escaping from beneath my coat!

Confessor #2: I was kicked out because I married a non-Quaker

Confessor #3: I just went to a non-Quaker wedding Confessor #4: I was seen with inappropriate company Confessor #5: I was deemed inappropriate company

They exit

#### 4. Revival movement sweeps America (Walk across stage with Sign)

**The Narrator**: #4: Gurney set the stage for Quakers to identify with other protestant denominations. In the 1870's and 80's a revival movement swept America. Traveling evangelicals held camp meetings, where people were saved and water baptized on the spot. This kind of approach was foreign to Friends up to this point. Camp meetings were especially popular with young people, like us.

Three Friends enter and hum the hymn - "Just As I am".

**The Narrator**: By 1890, many Gurneyite meetings were calling ministers to serve as paid pastors, moving toward programmed worship with sermons every Sunday and only short periods of silence. Musical instruments were also introduced to accompany planned singing.

#### 5. Conservative Friends split off.

**Narrator:** #5. The idea of programmed worship was too much for some Friends. Throughout North America at different times, they split off on their own and eventually reconnected with some of the Wilburites, in order to *conserve* what they saw as the original form of the Quaker movement, specifically silent worship. Thus they are known today as Conservative Friends.

As the Narrator speaks, Friends come and sit or stand on stage, as if in Meeting for Worship for Business. A Friend is reading.

**Kansas Clerk**: (From Kansas Conservative epistle in 1886) "[Friends,] Keep low, keep quiet, mind our own particular calling, our inward condition, and feel the Lord inwardly as the rock and sanctuary where none can make afraid."

#### 6. 1887 Richmond Declaration:

**The Narrator**: #6. In 1887, a conference of 95 delegates appointed by 12 yearly meetings representing the Orthodox branch of Friends across the world met in Richmond, Indiana. This conference met with the goal

of stopping the movement of Quakers towards accepting water baptism. The meeting issued a Declaration of Faith, which has been widely used by Orthodox Friends ever since. This is a small excerpt:

**The Narrator**: Quakers have always been good at documentation and record keeping. (pause) The hope was that writing a declaration would give all Friends a common platform on which to unite. Unfortunately, that did not happen.

# 7. Founding of the umbrella organizations:

**The Narrator**: #7. By 1900, diverse groups of Quakers were organizing themselves, though not in unity with one another. Orthodox Friends founded Five Years Meeting in 1902. The name was changed to Friends United Meeting in 1963. Friends United Meeting has done extensive missionary work throughout the world. As a result of their efforts, the largest Quaker population in the world today is in Kenya. This is our umbrella organization.

~Friend #1 from above steps forward and holds up a sign that says "FUM"

**The Narrator**: Though they were fellow Quakers, Ohio Yearly Meeting refused to participate in Five Years Meeting. Other friends joined efforts and formed Evangelical Friends Alliance in 1965. In 1989 it became Evangelical Friends International.

~EFI Friend comes forward on stage right and holds up a sign that says "EFI"

**The Narrator**: There are three conservative yearly meetings in the United States: North Carolina Conservative, Iowa Conservative, and Ohio Conservative.

**The Narrator:** The Hicksites founded Friends General Conference in 1900. They are traditionally unprogrammed and liberal Quakers.

~ Hicksite #1 comes forward stage left with a sign that says "FGC"

In 1885 Joel Bean, a former clerk of Iowa Yearly Meeting, moved to California and decided he didn't want to be involved in all this infighting anymore.

~Joel Bean, who has been standing on stage right, runs all the way across to the very left.

**The Narrator**: The movement he started is now Intermountain, Pacific, and North Pacific Yearly Meetings.

**The Narrator:** So, let's review. Let's review by fast forwarding from the beginning. Please help me count as the numbers appear on the screen.

The key points will be recapped by fast-forwarding through the action with hilarious speed. The narrator and the crowd shout out each number.

#1:

Fox and Fell enter, Police Officer drags Fox off stage. Fell follows looking angry.

#2

Penn runs onstage and says:

Penn: Let us then try what Love will do

Penn runs off.

#3:

Confessors 5 and 6 run on

**Confessor** #5: I was seen with inappropriate company **Confessor** #6: I was deemed inappropriate company

#4:

Quietism sign runs on stage saying, sh..sh...sh....

He runs off

#5:

1<sup>st</sup> Friend (beginning of the Declaration): "We believe in one holy"

**2<sup>nd</sup> Friend**: "Isa. 6:3, 58:15"

They run off stage

#7:

Four Friends with Four signs (FUM, EFI, Conservative and FGC) plus Joel Bean come forward, then drop the signs and link arms.


#### 8. So, here we are.

**The Narrator**: So, here we are. Thank you God! But wait, you say. There were only seven points in that skit. It's true. We are the eighth important point in Quaker history. We are, like Fox, young people searching for more out of life. We are seeking for ourselves what it means to be a follower of Jesus and a Quaker.

# Review Activity: Who's Who in Quakerism

**Who's Who in Quakerism**— Cut the strips apart and distribute them to the students. Have each student read their card aloud and have the other students guess who they are.

"I helped establish the Underground Railroad to help slaves escape from North Carolina to freedom in Indiana."
Answer: Levi Coffin
"Because of my concern for education among Quakers, New Garden Boarding School was established, which later became Guilford College."
Answer: Nathan Hunt
"I wasn't content with the way people were worshipping. I heard a voice telling me that Jesus could speak directly to me, and I began to preach this message everywhere I went. The people that followed me became known as 'Quakers.'"
Answer: George Fox
"I came to Massachusetts to tell people about the Light of Christ. In the Society of Friends, I was allowed to be a missionary, even though I was a woman. However, this made the Puritans that were living there very angry and I was imprisoned and eventually hanged on Boston Common."
Answer: Mary Dyer

"I lived in the Cane Creek community. During the American Revolution, I had to choose between fighting the British and staying true to my Quaker testimony of peace.
Answer: Simon Dixon
"My family and I were the first Quakers to live in North Carolina. We moved from Massachusetts and settled on the Perquimans River."
Answer: Henry Phillips
"My parents were members at New Garden Friends Meeting. When I grew up I became the wife of a president."
Answer: Dolley Madison
"I traveled to Quarterly Meeting with Rachel Wright (a long and dangerous journey for two women in those days) to ask that a meeting be set up at Cane Creek."
Answer: Abigail Pike

# George Fox, Founder of Quakerism

- > Born in England in 1624
- Had many questions about God, religion, and church
- At age 19, left home to search for answers to these questions
- Talked with many priests, preachers, and other people but could not find the Truth that he was searching for
- Went out by himself and then he heard God's voice



And when all my hopes in them and all men were gone, so that I had nothing outwardly to help me, nor could tell what to do, then I heard a voice which said, "There is one, even Christ Jesus that can speak to thy condition," and when I heard it, my heart did leap for joy.

#### What's In a Name?

- George Fox began preaching this Good News that God had revealed to him all across England.
- People that listened to him were called "Children of Light," because of their focus on the Inward Light
- ➤ They called themselves "Friends" John 15:15
- Fox told a judge that people should "quake and tremble before the Lord" and the judge began calling them "Quakers"

- Quakers were often persecuted for their beliefs and for going against the Church of England.
- England.
   Officials were angered by their refusal to take off their hats, pay tithes, bear arms, swear oaths, and attend the national church.








# **Quakers Come to America**

- The first Quakers arrived in what would become the United States of America in 1656
- Two women, Mary Fisher and Anne Austin, came to Puritan Massachusetts as missionaries
- Some Quakers came to America seeking religious freedom, others became martyrs in their attempts to witness to the Puritans



# Making Big Sacrifices

- Quakers left homes, friends, and families to come to America to spread the word of God.
- Many were persecuted, imprisoned, or sent back England
- Four Friends were hung on Boston Common for their witness

The woman of the house had a sense of God upon her; and the report of our travel had reached thither, and drawn some people that lived beyond Sommertown to that house in expectation to have seen and heard us (so acceptable was the sound of Truth in that wilderness country)" - George Fox's Journal


















## **Battle of Guilford Courthouse**

# The Manumission Society

In July 1816 an extensive manumission society (setting people free from slavery) came into existence. Meetings were held at Centre and Deep River. The group advocated a doctrine of immediate and unconditional emancipation.



# The Underground Railroad





Under the leadership of Levi and Vestal Coffin an "Underground Railroad" was established. This was a series of Quaker homes stretching from North Carolina to Indiana where slaves could find food and a place to sleep as they escaped to freedom.

## **Opening Icebreaker: Body Connections**

Each person chooses a partner. Two circles are formed. One partner is on the inside circle and the other—partner is on the outside circle, that actually encircles the other one. One group moves clockwise and the other counterclockwise. The leader blows a whistle, claps, or makes loud noise and yells out the names of two body parts (for example, "Elbow, knee!"). Partners must find each other and connect the two body parts. Give a few trial runs, and then you can eliminate the last couple to get in position. Involve those eliminated by having someone else yell and others watch for late connections. Other possible combinations: finger, foot; nose, shoulder; nose, armpit; thigh, thigh; hand, head.

# **Closing Application**

### **Grab Bag Insights**

# WHAT FRIENDS BELIEVE: **BASIC PRINCIPLES**

There's nothing like the Word of God for showing you the way to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. Every part of Scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or another—showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the Word we are put together and shaped 2 Timothy 3:16-17 (The Message) up for the tasks God has for us.

# **Opening Icebreaker: Who Do I listen To?**

Set up a beginning and a finish line. Choose one student and have them choose a partner. Blindfold the student and lead them to the start line. Turn them around so that they lose their bearings.

Tell them they must listen to their partner's instructions and follow only their partner's voice to get to the finish line. While they are blindfolded, have the other students vell out wrong directions to confuse the blindfolded student, so they must focus on listening only to their partner.

### The Big Red Box

**Characters:** Store clerk, Crowd of 4-6 Shoppers, Shopper looking for a free gift

<u>Set Up</u>: The setting is a store called "Kame Apart" which is identified by a large sign. Scattered around the stage are sale items: a hat rack with hats, a tie rack full of ties, a table of sunglasses, and a large box with a sign listing it's ingredients and the fact that it is free. (A *huge box big enough to hold a kitchen stove works best*) The box looks plain outside, but it is filled with hot-air balloons, each tied to a card with the Bible verse from Ephesians 2:8-10 written on it.

<u>The Skit</u>: A crowd of people stand outside make-believe glass doors. They are eagerly waiting to be let into the store. They push on the glass and say, "Open, open, open, open." When the store clerk opens the door they rush in frantically grabbing at the store merchandise.

The store clerk walks to a microphone and says, "Welcome to Kame Apart! The friendliest place on earth to spend all your hard-earned money. If you want it, need it, don't need it, or can't even afford it, we'll sell it to you! And to kick off this morning's shopping frenzy, check out the special in the fourth aisle! It's our deluxe line of Kame Apart ties on sale today for just \$5.99! If you act now, we'll throw in a set of ginsu knives free! This offer won't last long! Check it out!"

The crowd of shoppers runs to the fourth aisle (fourth pew of the church) where a tie rack suddenly pops up (thanks to a volunteer audience member.) They ravage the rack as they grab the ties and throw some up in the air. A tug of war ensues between two serious shoppers who both shout, "It's mine! I saw it first! No, it's mine! Is not! Is too!" One of them gives a big tug and wins the tie. Upon looking at it more closely, the shopper decides that she doesn't like the color and throws it aside.

The store clerk announces, "Attention shoppers, we've got a thirty second special in aisle one on cool sunglasses! You need them! You want them! You crave them! Well, we've got them! All the styles! All the colors! All of last year's unsold models that nobody really liked. And their all on sale for just a dollar and a quarter of your soul. But hurry! This limited offer won't last long!"

The shoppers run to aisle one to look at the sunglasses. On their way they are shouting, "Thirty seconds! Hurry up! Move out of the way! I'm getting there first! No you're not!" They descend on the sunglasses frantically grabbing at them in a selfish frenzy.

Another shopper enters the store and calmly browses through the sale items. The store clerk approaches and sneakily asks, "May I help you?" (In the following dialogue the store clerk excitedly interrupts the shopper with the words in parenthesis.) The shopper answers, "Yes, in fact you may. I'm looking for a very special gift for some friends of mine. It has to be the best present of ALL. (I think we can accommodate you!) It has to be very beautiful. (Yes, ravishing, enticing!) And unique. (Unrivaled, a one of a kind!) And valuable. (Oh yes! costly, expensive!) And it has to be FREE." At this word, the greedy store clerk suddenly turns sour and hostile, "Free? Are you crazy?! What kind of place do you think this is! Here I am trying to run a business, and what do I get? Nuts like you looking for handouts! Well, I'm sorry young man, but you're not going to find what you're looking for around here!" The store clerk stomps off.

The store clerk cynically announces, "Attention all you pathetic little shoppers, it's our final sale of the day. It's something you've all been selfishly waiting for, something to give your hopeless lives meaning, something to temporarily satisfy your pitiful little existence for another second or two. Yes,

yes, (mocking tone) it's beautiful, it's unique, it's valuable, and it's (pause) almost free! That's right, it's a hat sale! For just \$2.99 you can own your very own Pentecost Hat! We've got the newest styles! So run on up for a limited selection of our finest fake Pentecost hats, made from 100% imitation synthetic fabric, designed to fulfill your earthly fantasies forever, or at least for a day or two. (The crowd descends on the hat rack grabbing at the merchandise.)

While the crowd ravages the hats, the new shopper walks over to a big red box. He examines it with curious determination. Suddenly he yells to the other shoppers, "Hey! Come over here!" When the crowd gathers around the box, the shopper asks, "Do you know what this is?" They answer, "No." The shopper points, "Look at this! The ingredients are listed here on the side. It says, 'Ingredients: Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, happiness, faith, life, and truth! There are a lot of other things listed on here too!"

The store clerk, who has been watching the scene, interrupts the shopper, "All right, that's enough! What would you want that for anyway? It's good for nothing and besides that box could never fit in a mini-van. It's way too huge!" The shoppers seem to agree. Individuals say, "Yes, it's too big. The only thing I see is a big ugly box. We don't even know what's inside."

The shopper, who has been examining the box closely, suddenly interrupts, "Hey, look here! It says that it's FREE!" The store clerk immediately chimes in, "Free? Free? Well, if it's free, then it must not be worth very much! I bet it's empty anyway! Come on people, move along now! We're just about to announce our last sale of the day." They begin to walk away.

The shopper suddenly shouts, "Wait a minute! Listen to this! It says that it has a guarantee! It says: 'Ideal for children and adults, guaranteed to fill your life with love, happiness, fun and excitement. Caution: May cause growing pains, but in the end, it is guaranteed to improve your attitude, vision, thoughts, speech, and prolong your life indefinitely.' Wow! That sounds great! This is what I've been looking for! It's a perfect gift and it's absolutely free!"

The crowd seems interested, but the store clerk is skeptical. The shopper exclaims, "What are we waiting for? Let's open it up!" They open the box and are surprised to find red balloons in side with dove-shaped cards tied to them. A verse on the cards reads, "By grace we have been saved through faith, and this is not our own doing, it is the free gift of God, not the result of works, so no one may boast. For we are God's handiwork created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we might walk in them." Ephesians 2:8-10.

The shopper says, "This is the perfect gift! And it's for all of us to share. Let's give them away!" They hand out the balloons as the congregation shares the peace of the Lord with each other. The End.

<u>Biblical Emphasis</u>: Eph. 2:8-10, Acts 2:1-4, Joel 2:28, Phil. 5:22-23. The gift of salvation is free to all who believe in Jesus Christ. The gifts of the Spirit are more fulfilling and valuable than anything the world can offer.



### **Opening Icebreakers: Blind Truth**

GO MAYBE

Use a flip chart and list out all the parts, tools, and things that happen in a Meeting for Worship. Have students share these. You might want to collect a few old bulletins from your Meeting if that tool is used. Once the class cannot list many more, give to each person a green, orange/yellow, and red card. As you call out one of the items, ask each participant to raise a color to indicate the value for them.

**ORANGE/YELLOW** - Sometimes a real need, but could most often go with or without.

**RED** - Gotta go, definitely distracting from the gathered attention, not necessary for your worship experience.

Soldier 2: Hey, wait a minute, they're still worshipping!

Solider 1: Let's get them! This time we'll take all the women! (Soldiers arrest all the female Quakers; they exit, the children continue to worship.)

Soldier 2: I can't believe it! We've arrested their fathers and mothers and the kids are still worshipping God!

Solider 1: Nothing can stop those Quakers from worshipping!

### George Fox, The Man Who Wouldn't Go To Church

In England three hundred years ago, everybody went to church. It was the law that they had to do so. The law even said that if more than five people met to worship anywhere other than in a church or if anyone said one word against the church, they would be thrown into jail.

George Fox had been going to church since he was a small child and he began to ask questions about the things that happened there. He wondered why the minister stood in front of the church many steps above all the people. Why was he so high above everyone else? The preacher said it was very important for everyone to do just as they were told while in church. There were certain times to kneel and certain times to stand. If the name of Jesus was mentioned people had to bow their heads. The minister seemed to be the only one who understood God and the only one great enough to pray to God.

George began to question his local ministers and church authorities, but his questions only made them angry. When he was 19 years old he set out on a journey to find answers to these questions. He wandered from town to town for two years. He began to doubt the authority of the church officials. Were all their prayers and song, their churches with high beautiful steeples, their rules and long sermons really getting them closer to God?

He still felt very alone and unsure of how to worship God. He went alone into the woods, away from the steeples and the choirs and the altars. He read his Bible, wondered and thought, and tried to pray. In the stillness of the woods such wonderful ideas came to him. It seemed that God must be speaking to him. No priest was telling him what to say or when to speak. He didn't have to kneel. God seemed closer to him than his own heart.

He realized that if God could talk to him, a simple weaver's son, then God could speak to any man, woman, or child in the world who would really listen. He spent the rest of his life helping other people find God. In the meetings he held, anyone could be the preacher, even women and children could speak if they heard God's message. Sometimes they would all sit quietly without saying a word for hours at a time. They were trying to listen for God. Other times God would give one of them some words of truth to be shared with the others gathered. They met regularly to find God's Truth. Fox's mission was to take people to Christ and leave them there so that they could be taught directly by Christ.

### **Opening Icebreaker: Art-a-Back**

Form teams with your group. Any number will work, but at least four in each team is best. With a small group, just form one team. Instruct them to sit on the floor, in a line, one person behind another, looking at the person's back in front of them. The first person in the front of each line receives a piece of paper and pencil or marker. No talking is allowed by the team from this point and everyone must face forward. The person in the back of each line is shown a picture of a simple drawing of an object (house, cup, candle, sunset, clouds and birds, etc. ...). The person in the back of each row uses their finger to draw the image on the person's back sitting in front of them. This drawing continues to the front person. The front person then draws onto the paper what they have felt drawn on their back. Compare the finished drawing with the original.

### **Discussion:**

- What made this exercise difficult? (The final product depended on one person's ability to draw and pass on their best at portraying the identity of the image ... then another, and another, until finally, the one to draw on paper. The picture handed down was only their perception from what had been shared.)
- How can this be related or compared to our faith and our beliefs?

### Lead-In Activity: Open Discussion

It is often helpful and enriching to ask the students about their past experiences with the sacraments. This gives students a chance to tell about their faith journey, and it gives the teacher a chance to affirm the Christian experiences of others with the sacraments, while still teaching the Friends view.

A few questions to ask could be:

- Have any of you ever experienced water baptism or been present for others?
- What was that experience like for you?
- Have you been part of church that carried out a process of communion?
- Tell us how it was done, and what it meant to you.

### **Small Group Discovery**

# FRIENDS AND THE SACRAMENTS

## THE QUAKER FAITH IS POSITIVE

FRIENDS BELIEVE in the baptism of the Holy Spirit, as set forth in the New Testament.

FRIENDS BELIEVE that communion with the Living Christ is an inward, spiritual experience.

FRIENDS BELIEVE that worship should be "in spirit and in truth." This makes the performance of ceremonial rituals unnecessary.

FRIENDS RESPECT the reverent use of rituals by other people who may find them helpful. All people have the right to approach God in whatever ways seem to them to be right and good. Our simple statement is that for ourselves we do not find external rituals to be necessary. The purpose of these brief paragraphs is to explain why Friends omit the use of bread and wine and water baptism.

## A SPIRITUAL DISCOVERY

The founder of the Quaker movement, George Fox, discovered that the life—transforming encounter with the Living Christ which he sought actually came as the result of intense personal seeking and not through the performance of rituals prescribed by the established church.

The Quaker position was not a pre-planned doctrine but rather the result of actual experience. In seventeenth century England, Fox and many like-minded seekers assembled to worship "in spirit and in truth." In so doing, they discovered that they could commune with the Living Christ without the performance of outward ritual of any kind. They simply continued to worship in this manner. Thus the simple form of Quaker worship came into existence.

As a devout student of the Holy Scriptures, George Fox came to the conclusion that Jesus did not institute any external rituals whatsoever, either as a rite of initiation into the Christian faith, or as a formal observance in worship.

From that day forward the Society of Friends (Quakers) has emphasized inward spiritual reality, rather than outward performances.

### BIBLE COMMANDMENTS

One needs to distinguish between literal and spiritual interpretations of scriptural commandments.

For example, Jesus told his disciples that they should wash one another's feet (John 13:14). We believe that for us in our day, this means humble service and not necessarily the literal use of water and towels.

Conditions and circumstances change through the centuries. Many things that were customary in Bible times are not necessary in our day. Old Testament customs such as burnt offerings and certain feast days belong to an era that has passed. In New Testament times, Paul commanded Christians to greet one another with a holy kiss. He commanded women to wear their hair long, to keep silent in church and other things belonging to first century customs and circumstances.

It is not the letter but the spirit of the Gospels which is vitally important (II Cor. 3:6).

Spiritual discernment enables us to distinguish between literal and spiritual interpretations, between essentials and nonessentials.

### THE BREAD OF LIFE

Jesus said, "I am the bread of life" (John 6:35). Friends understand that this is to be given a spiritual interpretation. Bread and wine can be symbols only.

Friends bear witness to the truth of the words spoken by the Eternal Christ in Revelation 3:20: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and sup with him, and he with me." This is Quaker communion—an inward personal experience. To this we aspire in our simple mode of

worship. We commend this experience to all persons everywhere.

In talking to his disciples at the Passover supper, Jesus spoke of "eating his flesh and drinking his blood." This was not literally intended, nor was it literally possible. Only a spiritual interpretation is reasonable. Absorbing the Spirit of Christ is achieved, Friends believe, not through the use of symbols, but rather through the day—to—day process of spiritual worship and inward communion.

As to the bread and wine used at the Passover supper, one should remember that Jesus and his disciples were Jews. They were observing the Jewish Passover (feast of unleavened bread). Friends hold that Jesus was merely giving a new meaning to the old Jewish Passover and *not* instituting an external ritual for the church—to—be.

Among the four Gospels, Friends turn most often to the Gospel of John, which emphasizes most fully the spiritual interpretation of the Christian faith. In this gospel, more than the others, the supreme emphasis is placed upon humble service and sacrificial love. The literal use of bread and wine is not mentioned.

### THE EXAMPLE OF JESUS

It can be pointed out that Jesus himself was baptized in the river Jordan.

This is true. Jesus was a Jew. He grew up in a Jewish home, in the Old Testament tradition. He observed Old Testament customs. He was dedicated in the Temple. He observed the Passover and other feast days. He offered the customary sacrifices, attended worship in the local synagogue and kept the seventh day as Sabbath. There were many things in his early life which are not required of us today.

Water baptism, a rite of symbolic purification, was a Jewish ritual in existence before the time of

### THE WATER OF LIFE

Friends do not practice water baptism for the simple reason that they do not find it to be necessary. St. Paul said, "One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all..." (Eph. 4:5). For Friends this one essential baptism is the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. This is a continuing experience, not a once—in—a—lifetime event.

John the Baptist, forerunner of Jesus, foresaw that his symbolic water baptism was to be replaced by a spiritual experience in the days just ahead. He said, "I indeed baptize you with water, but He that cometh after me...shall baptize you with the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 3:11). He also said, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30). He recognized clearly that his preaching and his water baptism were preliminary in nature, with something greater to follow which would make his symbolic water baptism obsolete.

The use of the ritual and ceremony developed very early in the Christian church, but Friends insist that this was not commanded by the Lord himself. The water baptism practiced by the early church may have been helpful to new converts as an initiation rite under certain circumstances, but Friends hold that even then it was not essential to salvation. The Gospel of John clearly states that Jesus himself did not baptize, "only his disciples" (John 4:2).

In interpreting the statement of Jesus concerning being born of water and the Spirit," it should be remembered that in the original Greek text of the Gospels the words are "water" and "wind," both symbolic. Obviously Jesus was referring to flesh and spirit, for man is both body and soul. Friends hold that neither entering a gale of wind nor a pool of water—literally—is essential to salvation.

Paul baptized only a few, a very few, of his converts. He did not remember just how many. "For Christ sent me not to baptize, but to preach the gospel."

### IN SUMMARY

When the Apostles and other leaders in the early church assembled at Jerusalem to decide what ceremonial observances should be required of Gentile converts, the conclusion reached, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, made no mention of rituals (Acts 15).

Friends, believe that Jesus called his followers to a simple, direct, spiritual form of worship. The day of Old Testament rituals had passed. A new era had come. Jesus sought to "cleanse the temple" of external ceremonial observances. The approach to God in prayer was simple and direct: "When you pray, say 'Our Father...'."

Friends believe that worship is a personal, positive act of seeking, rather than a performance—that communion is an inner spiritual experience rather than an outward observance.

The Quaker position is well expressed in the inspired words of Micah: "He has showed you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justly, love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).

Have the students come up with two true statements and one false statement about themselves. Students share their statements with the group and have the others try to guess which statement is false.

### Scripture Scramble

Divide group into teams. Cut apart the words of Scripture - Matthew 5:36-37. One full set for each team. This will be a race to put the verse in order.

"And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make even one hair white or black. Simply let your 'Yes" be 'Yes' and your 'No' be 'No'; anything beyond this comes from the evil one."

Discussion: Do people lie about themselves in the real world? How does it make you feel when someone lies to you or about you or someone else? How honorable are your words? Do you live what you say you believe?

### DVD Segment 1: What R Testimonies & Life and Action

### Visit by John Woolman

John Woolman's belief in equality went beyond his concern about slavery. He lived in a time of tension between Native Americans and white settlers, and worked to promote understanding between the two groups. Shortly after a settlement had been attacked, Woolman and a friend set out to visit the Native Americans. They were very

successful at reaching a mutual respect with the Indians, helping to soothe some of the ill will that had been so detrimental to their relationship.

### **DVD Segment 2: Integrity**

### **Visit by Lucretia Mott**

Lucretia Mott lived a simple life by being willing to give up unnecessary, luxurious things in order to focus on God's calling. Though she was often involved in controversy, challenging the beliefs and practices of others, she was a devoted Quaker woman who let her love for God and others flow through all she did.

Good Stewards: Psalm 24:1 reminds us that the earth is the Lord's and everything in it belongs to Him. Therefore, to honor God we should take care of his earth and the natural resources in it. By doing things like recycling and cutting down on the amount of "stuff" we are using, we can preserve precious resources like clean water, trees, clean air, and land.

### Paper Sack Potential

**Supplies:** One paper bag for ever 4-5 students filled with various random items (Example: paper towel rolls, tape, cotton balls, gift bows, small toys, spoons, paper plates, empty soda cans, other random household items)

### Open Worship: Looking into a Crystal Ball

"Imagine you find a crystal ball. An image appears on the glass and you take a closer look to see what it is. In the image you see masses of people barbecuing steaks in their nice, spacious backyards. Then another scene appears of an African child with a bloated tummy, crying because she is hungry.

"You see visions of people watching color televisions and munching on snacks, then, into the image, comes masses of poor people eating food out of dumpsters with only a cardboard box for a home.

"You see reports of major companies paying little or no taxes but paying record breaking salaries to their executives, and then you see 20 people in India living in one thatched roof hut.



"You see a doctor's office with a typical American having a check-up, getting shots, and talking to their doctor about nutrition and healthcare, but then you see a little boy dying of malaria because his family didn't have money for healthcare and medicine.

"You see a nation of people with not one but two cars in the garage but then the crystal ball switches over to a family of migrant farm workers sweating in their seven-days-a-week, 12-hours-a-day jobs making \$50 a week.

"Then you see what appears to be the face of Jesus. His eyes are misty and there's a tear on his cheek. Then, flashing like a mirror, you gaze into the crystal ball and see yourself."

### **Additional Activities**

• **Practice Simplicity:** Have young Friends pledge to give up something for a week (buying new clothes, wasting gas, eating meat, drinking soda). At the end of the week have them report on how it felt to go without those things.



- **Recycling:** If your meeting does not recycle, have the young Friends start a recycling program. If they already recycle, encourage other ecological ideas such as washing dishes rather than using disposable ones at meals.
- As I Say, Not As I Do: This game is a variation on Simon Says. The leader calls out something to do (example put your hand on your stomach) but does something different (example puts his/her hand on his/her head). If kids

do what the leader does rather than what he/she says, then they are out. Say: "How many of you have heard your parents say, 'Do as I say, not as I do?' Part of living with integrity is not only saying what you believe but living it out as well."

• Cookie Distribution: (Supplies-Cookies, at least 10 but probably 1 per student) Here's another way to look at the distribution of world resources. Divide the students into 3 groups. One group should have 10% of the students (United States), one group should have should have 30% of the students (Other Developed Nations), and one group should have 60% of the students (Developing Nations). Bring in a box of cookies. Give the US group 6 cookies. Give the developed

nations 3 of the cookies. Give the developing nations 1 cookie.

Have the students discuss how they feel about this distribution.



### "Visit" from John Woolman

(Enter actor dressed as John Woolman)

Woolman: I come to you today as John Woolman. I was born in 1720 to a Quaker weaver and farmer who taught me the early on the value of hard work. I recorded a childhood incident in my *Journal* that gives an example of what was important to me in terms of my moral character. Would you mind if I read it, Friends?

"Once going to a neighbor's house I saw on the way a robin sitting on her nest, and as I came near she went off, but having young ones, flew about, and with many cries expressed her concern for them; I stood and threw stones at her, until one striking her, she fell down dead. At first I was pleased with the exploit, but after a few moments was seized with horror, as having in a sportive way, killed an innocent creature while she was careful for her young. I beheld her lying dead, and thought those young ones, for which she was so careful, must now perish for want of their dam to nourish them; and after some painful consideration on the subject, I climbed up the tree, took all the young birds and killed them; supposing that better than to leave them to pine away and die miserably."

I learned from this experience that it is wrong to "say that we love God and at the same time exercise cruelty toward the least creature moving by His life." Another issue of the utmost importance to me was slavery. When I was twenty, I decided that farm life was not for me and went to work at a general store in town. One day my employer asked me to draw up a bill of sale for a slave he owned, and I was much troubled by this. Eventually I decided to do it since the slave was going to and elderly Friend and would be treated well, but I told both parties that I felt slavery was a practice that went against the Christian faith. The next time I was asked to write a bill of sale for a slave, I politely declined.

As a traveling minister, I had many opportunities to share my views on slavery and the equality of all people. When those I stayed with were slave owners themselves, I always attempted to reimburse their slaves for their labor, often to the embarrassment and frustration of the people who had offered me hospitality. I was always polite but firm in my upholding of the testimony of equality, and eventually Friends came around to see the truth in this matter.

I also felt that I could not take advantage of the labor of slaves in any way, and so I did not use dyed cloth, for the dyes were made by slaves. Instead I wore plain, un-dyed clothes. I did not use West Indian sugar or molasses or any other products raised by slave labor. This was a very unique witness to the Friends of my day. Because I gave up these things that most people had, my dress and diet were much different than other people, but I did not care. To me, it was more important to live out my values than to follow the current fashions of my day.

I wrote in my journal that "To conform a little to a wrong way strengthens the hands of such who carry wrong customs to their utmost extent." By this, I meant that if we conform even a little to the wrong way, we are supporting people who do terribly wrong things. I believed that if I enjoyed or used products made by slave labor, then what I was really doing was supporting the evil of slavery and slave-owning. This is what integrity means to me. Not only should we strive to be honest in the words that we say but our entire lives must be consistent. We have to live out our beliefs in the words we say and the actions that we do.

I hope you young Friends will wait on the Lord to show you what must be done in your day.

### "Visit" from Lucretia Mott

(Enter student or volunteer dressed as Lucretia Mott. If possible she should wear a grey dress and Quaker bonnet with a ragged shawl.)

LM: I was born in 1793 on Nantucket Island, the daughter of a sea captain. As a child, sitting still in meeting was hard for me. Once when I was daydreaming, I happened to hear some Friends speaking about simplicity. They were saying that worldly pleasures could be a stumbling block in a person's spiritual life. I was so anxious to be a good Quaker that when I went home from meeting, I went up to my bedroom and looked at my clothes. I thought: "They couldn't be any simpler. What can I do to be the best Quaker I can be?" As I thought this I looked down and on my shoes were little blue bows. I was still determined to do something so I got the scissors and snipped those bows off. Many years later, when I was given a beautiful shawl with a lovely fringe around the bottom, I remembered the testimony of simplicity and cut off most of the fringe, leaving a ragged, knotted edge. I couldn't bring myself to cut it all off. I wore the shawl for many years with the ragged edge.

When I grew up I married James Mott and we lived in the Philadelphia area. We had a family of six children. My children's parties became famous because I gave each child little packets of candy with anti-slavery messages on them, such as "Take this, my friend, you need not fear to eat it; No slave hath toiled to cultivate this sweet." I was never able to separate my religion from my everyday life. When my son died of fever, I nearly died myself. After this experience, I was moved to speak in meeting and I discovered I had a gift for inspiring others with my ministry. I became a Quaker minister shortly thereafter. I am told that my power as a public speaker was rare for a woman in my day.

I was appointed by Philadelphia Yearly Meeting to attend an anti-slavery event in England, and I traveled by boat to go there. I was astonished when I was refused my seat at the conference because I was a woman. I returned to Philadelphia determined to work for women's rights. I presided over the first Convention of American Women in Pennsylvania Hall. A mob broke into the Hall objecting to the anti-slavery program of the convention, not to mention the presence of negroes in the Hall. I was frightened by the mob, but I held firmly to the integrity that had been instilled in me and I stood by my principles. African-Americans were always welcome at my home and white people who didn't like it were welcomed not to return.

By living simply and not worrying about nice clothing or how I looked, I was able to devote more time to important causes like the abolition of slavery and working for women's rights.

#### **DVD Segment 1: Peace**

What comes to mind when you hear the word peace? Perhaps you think of a hippie holding up two fingers, or a white dove, or the familiar circular sign. Maybe you imagine a calm lake or a sleeping baby. Peace can mean different things to different people.

Faith and Practice, pages 47-48: "We condemn war as the greatest violation of the sacredness of human life and reaffirm our faith that all war is absolutely contrary to the plain precepts of Christ and the whole spirit of His Gospel... It is our purpose to live in that spirit that takes away the occasion for war and to suffer violence, if necessary, as did our Lord, but never return evil for evil."

#### **DVD Segment 2: Peace**

Which PEACE is harder for you to find -

Peace with God?

Peace with family, friends, and community?

Peace among *nations*?

Peace within vourself?



Visit by William Penn—By replacing his sword with love, William Penn practiced what he preached and preached only what he practiced. He lived out the Quaker testimony of peace by giving up his sword and by establishing a colony based on freedom and brotherly love. Through his just dealings with Native Americans he treated them fairly and avoided bloody fighting between them.

#### **DVD Segment 3: Community**

#### **Tension in Relationships**

Gather everyone in a circle. Pass out a variety of rubber bands, some thin ones, a few large ones, and thicker ones. Each person takes one. Participants hook a finger inside the rubber band and link together with the person on their right and left. Everyone should be linked in one big circle by a rubber band on the right and left. Have group members to gradually step back stretching the rubber bands between them as far as possible, without a break! Observe the responses from everyone as they are being stretched.

Discussion: What will happen if you continue to step back? Who will likely be hurt when the band breaks? How is this tension the same as with parents, family, friends, and enemies? How does this exercise connect with relationships, community building, bonds with others, etc.?

# **Closing Application**

#### **Open Worship**

How important is it that we are at PEACE with God, ourselves, family, friends, community, or peoples?

#### **Read Scripture**

Quaker Challenge from George Fox: "We should stop fights and start friendships."

#### **Closing Prayer**

Then and only then, come back and work things out with God.

#### **Additional Activities**

- Newspaper Power: Give half of the students rolled up newspapers or other kinds of thick paper rolled up. Have the students with and without newspapers interspersed throughout the room. Tell the students they have three minutes to 'use' their newspapers. Do not suggest they use them as weapons; just tell them to 'use' them. It is very likely that some or all of the students will use the newspapers to hit each other. Then have them change places for another three minutes.
- Peace Vigil: Organize and sponsor a peace vigil at your meeting to pray for peace.
- Panel Discussion: Organize a panel of speakers from your meeting or surrounding area made up of Friends who have lived out the peace testimony in different ways. (Ex: a Quaker who has served in the military, a conscientious objector, Friends who practice war tax resistance, etc)
- Field Trip: Take young Friends to see "The Sword of Peace" an outdoor drama about Quakers' stand for peace during the Revolutionary War in Snow Camp, NC. Website www.snowcampdrama.org or brochure for schedule and tickets.

#### <u>Visit by William Penn – Peace</u>

(Enter student dressed as William Penn. If possible he can wear a Quaker hat and carry a sword as a prop which he will later lay down.)

William Penn: I was born in London in 1644. My father was a naval officer who was knighted as Admiral Sir William Penn. I had an experience when I was ten years old that prepared me for my later conversion to Quakerism. I was alone in my room when the room was suddenly infused with "a glow of light." It lasted only an instant but it left me feeling warm and very close to God. This feeling stayed with me throughout my youth. I was what you might call a rebel. While I was at Oxford University in 1660, I opposed the law that everyone must attend the Church of England because I believed in religious freedom. I met with other rebellious students and I was eventually expelled from school. My father didn't approve and he sent me to France and Italy hoping I would forget my religious ideas (what a punishment, huh?) For awhile this worked, and I became focused on trends and fancy dress. But then in 1667 my father sent me to Ireland to manage some of his estates. There I met Thomas Loe, a Quaker, who convinced me of the truth of the Quaker way of life with its simplicity and non-violent ways. These were hard times for Quakers who were mocked, imprisoned, and sometimes put to death. I myself was put into prison three times.

When I returned to England the suffering of my people during the Black Plague and the London Fire deeply depressed me. I went to Ireland on family business at that time and attended a Quaker meeting where one Thomas Loe spoke. I sat among those plaindressed Friends in my sword and plumed hat. When Friend Thomas had finished speaking, I was so moved that I could only stand and cry. I was 22 years old when I left that meeting and started out in my new life. I adopted a new style of Quaker clothes, simple but elegant. I had a hard time giving up my sword. I asked George Fox what I should do and he said, "Wear it as long as thou canst." I soon found my heart too full of love to carry a weapon of steel at my side.

I served many months in English prisons because of my Quaker beliefs. When I came out of prison, I was determined to establish a colony in the New World where people could worship as they chose. I married a Quaker girl named Gulielma Springett. My father died in 1670. The king, Charles II, owed my father £16,000 (which was a lot of money back then!). After my father's death, I asked the king to repay the debt with wilderness land in America. In 1681, a charter was granted and the hope of going to a new land of religious freedom was realized for many Quakers. In October of 1682 I sailed up the Delaware River and made a treaty with the Native Americans. I tried to always be fair and honest with them, rather than cheating them and stealing their land like so many settlers did. This may have been why they never attacked the colony. Under the charter granted to me by the king, I was given full power over the wilderness area granted to me. The king's council named it Pennsylvania or "Penn's Woods." I wanted the colony to be a "commonwealth," a "Holy Experiment" of a group of people united by common interests, and these interests were to be freedom, democracy, and peace.

I believe that today, the people who become Quakers are drawn to this faith because of our actions which show what we believe. You have heard people say 'Practice what you preach.' Well, I believe we should 'preach only what we practice.' All people are equal and have rights as children of God and we are called to live at peace with everyone. Jesus was talking about this when he said that the Kingdom of God is here and now. God is present. God speaks to us. It is our part to respond and listen to that of God in every person.

My goal is to seek God's will for me in the relationships of nations and of people. It means to love and to serve and live in peace. This is what I believe."



Form groups of five to eight people, giving each group two pieces of paper and a pen. Each group compiles a list of the things they have in common as



a group. In order for it to make the list, it must apply to everyone in the subgroup. Avoid writing things that people can see, like everyone has hair, is wearing clothes, etc... Get them to dig deeper. After five minutes of compiling, have each group share their list with whole group.

In the second phase, you can switch people around, or leave them in the same small group. This task is to list those unique qualities within the group. On the second sheet of paper have them to record those things that only apply to ONE person within the small group. The small group should strive to come up with two unique things to list for each person in their small group. Again, go beyond the superficial. Have groups share.



# **DVD Segment 1: Equality**



#### Visit by Levi Coffin

Levi Coffin was a successful Quaker businessman. He was always careful to tell the truth, even if it was not the whole truth about a runaway slave. Once a marshal asked if he had seen two runaway slaves and he said, "Yes, I saw them at the gate," without adding that they had entered the gate and were currently eating breakfast at his house.

When you see someone, what do you notice first?

Which is harder for you to see in others – things in common or ways that you are different? Wonder why?

What do you usually remember in a person?

How should we see each other?

An old Quaker phrase: "coming to know each other in that which is eternal" -

What does that mean?



Preparation: Use a muffin pan for different colors of food coloring and add a little water to each. (Keep Yellow separate!)

Fold a coffee filter in half two or three times. Demonstrate to the class. Say: Remember your most recent agreement or fuss with someone? How did you feel? (Hold the filter by the point and slightly dip one edge of the filter into the colored water – don't use yellow yet.) Say: Do you know people that think that they are always right and want everyone to agree with them? Have you ever felt the same way? (Slightly dip the other corner or edge of the filter in a different color, but not yellow). Say: God created us all to be different, so obviously we are going to disagree but we don't have to fight about it. God wants us to be the same in two ways: loving him & living in peace with each other. (Now, slightly dip the point of the filter in yellow). Say: What happens when we love God first and love our neighbors? (Hold up your coffee filter; yellow should be in the center, connecting the other colors). Say: With God's love in the center of our lives, He will enable us to connect and love others in the way we should, if we are open to His leading.

Prayer: Lord, I thank you for your unlimited love for me. Help me to see others as you see them, and love them as you love them.



Visit by Elizabeth Fry

#### **Visit from Levi Coffin**

Introduction: Today we are going to be visited by a man who spent his life working to free people from slavery so that everyone could live freely, regardless of the color of their skin. (Enter actor dressed as Levi Coffin. If possible he should wear overalls, like a farmer or a suit.)

LC: I was born in 1798 in North Carolina. I grew up in an area with many slaves. My parents, like most Quakers in the area, owned no slaves. One day, when I was seven years old, I was helping my father chop wood on the side of the road. A large group of slaves came down the road. They were chained together and being driven by a man with a whip. When my father



asked one of them why they were chained, his answer changed my life. He said they were chained because their wives and children had been taken from them and their owners were afraid they would try to run away to get them back. I tried to imagine what such a life would be like. This experience haunted me and I decided to spend my life working to free other slaves from having that experience.

I grew up and married, and like many other Quakers, my family and I moved westward to Indiana to escape the southern slave culture. I set up a general story in Newport, Indiana which I ran for many years. I helped many slaves escape who made their way through my community. I became know far and wide as the "President" of the Underground Railroad. Some of my customers did not approve of my "activities," but my business still prospered.

Later I felt that God was calling me to move to Cincinnati, Ohio to open a free wholesale produce store which sold only those goods not produced by slave labor. Unlike many such small businesses that went under because of not making a profit, I was able, with hard work, to keep my business afloat. I used my buying trips to the south as opportunities for ministry, speaking to everyone I met about the evils of slavery. I spent a good deal of my own money on food, clothing and transportation for the slaves. The Prince of Wales once came by to see the "southern depot of the Underground Railroad." I waved at him from the front porch and continued amusing my guests with stories of escaped slaves I had helped.

#### (Exit Levi Coffin)

Summary: Levi Coffin was a good Quaker and a successful businessman. He knew the Bible very well and used it to the advantage of his testimony of equality. He was always careful to tell the truth, even if it was not the *whole* truth about a runaway slave. Once a marshal asked if he had seen two runaway slaves and he said, "Yes, I saw them at the gate," without adding that they had entered the gate and were currently eating breakfast at his house. Levi Coffin allowed God to lead him, and God led him to help his oppressed people.

# Visit by Elizabeth Fry

Introduction: She was born in 1780 to a wealthy English family, could have chosen a life of comfort and ease after marrying Joseph John Fry, a man of great wealth. Instead, she had eleven children, all of whom lived to adulthood, and despite her often ill health, she worked diligently for prison reform in England as well as becoming a Quaker minister and serving as a hostess for her husband in his business entertaining. She always reached out on a personal level to those around her in need of Christian compassion.

(Enter woman dressed as Elizabeth Fry. If possible she should wear a gray dress and Quaker bonnet.)

EF: I was one of seven lively daughters raised at beautiful Earlham Hall in England, where music and dancing were frequent. My family was Quaker, but we were wealthy and enjoyed all the pleasures that wealth afforded us. One day in meeting, while I was admiring my new red shoes with purple laces, a man named William Savery rose to speak. After he was finished I cried. Afterwards, I began to think about some of the things he said and I became unhappy with my life of ease and pleasure-seeking. Later, on a trip to Ireland, I met a spiritually powerful woman named Deborah Darby, who looked directly at me and said, "You will be a light to the blind, speech to the dumb, and feet to the lame." That day I wrote in my journal, "I know now what the mountain is that I have to climb. I am to be a Quaker." I was so serious about this calling that not long after I opened a school for poor children in the laundry room of Earlham Hall, eventually enrolling 80 students.

When I heard of the terrible conditions of the women prisoners at Newgate Prison, I became determined to visit them and see first hand. Both women and their children were living in the prison at that time. Some of the women had committed serious crimes, but some had been thrown in jail because they were in debt and didn't have very much money. I went among the wild and dirty women of Newgate in my bonnet and somber dress. The prison officials were appalled when I picked up a dirty, naked, diseased child off the floor of the prison and spoke to the women about improving conditions for their children. What surprised the officials even more was that the women began responding and trying to do as I instructed them. The success of these trips was such that I became known internationally. I organized a committee of other well-to-do women to work for prison reform, and the Quaker bonnet became a symbol to the prisoners for the love and work of Christ in their lives.

(Exit Elizabeth Fry)

Summary:

Elizabeth Fry was always sensitive to the needs of others. She used her connections, her talents, and her skills in the service of God's kingdom. She used her money and status for social reform. She was a natural organizer and a skillful nurse. She lovingly read the Bible to prisoners at Newgate. She was a caring, gentle woman who loved God and her fellow human beings.

#### Opening Icebreaker: Back-to-Back

Divide group into pairs and have them sit on the floor back to back and link arms. Then tell them to stand up. With a little timing and cooperation, it shouldn't be too hard. Then combine two pairs into a foursome. Have them sit on the floor back to back with arms linked. Tell them to stand up. Keep adding more people to the group until the group can stand as one whole body or they give up and can't stand up anymore.

#### Lead-In Activity: Way 2 Decide

#### Give the students the following issue:

The church has asked to youth group to voluntarily start cleaning the whole church twice a month, not receiving pay. The youth group must make a decision together. Have the group to role play each of the following processes or methods.

#### Connection

Form small teams, three or more to a team. Each team forms a line, while you secure each person's wrist to the person on each side of them by using yarn or masking tape. Leave folks on the ends untied, so that you are not forming a circle. Each small group must work together as a team to perform tasks at



various stations around the room. It is a race to complete each tasks before the other teams. Have at least two more tasks than the number of teams. Challenge groups with tasks that require two hands to complete.

Examples: fold a paper airplane, cut something out of paper, safety pin something onto something else, untie and re-tie someone's shoe, build something, pour drink for someone to drink, etc... Plan a FINAL task in which the entire team is involved, whole team does a forward roll together on the floor. Rule: if tape breaks or someone comes undone, the entire team has to come together to be re-joined.

#### Discussion

In what ways was this an easy activity? What made it difficult?

How did you decide who would lead? Who followed?

How did you choose which tasks to attempt and how you would go about completing each of them?

Is there a correlation to how "church works" and this exercise?



# **Quaker Circles**



Each holds up a sign or has one tied around their necks.

**MM** (One person): Hi, I'm the Monthly Meeting. I'm made up of all the people in one congregation. We meet once a month for business meeting. We handle things that deal specifically with our meeting like how to spend the money we collect during offering, local concerns and outreach, and the programs and activities of our meeting. (squats down)

**QM (One person or 3-4)**: Hi, I'm the Quarterly Meeting. I'm made up of all the monthly meetings in a geographical area. We meet four times a year (or *quarterly*) for worship and business meeting. The Quarterly Meeting helps monthly meetings work together to spread Friends' witness and influence. (QM puts arms around or forms small circle around MM)

**YM** (More people than QM): Hi, I'm the Yearly Meeting. I'm made up of all the quarterly meetings in a regional area. We meet annually (that's right, *yearly*) for fellowship and business. (YM circle around QM)

**FUM (More people than YM)**: Hi, I'm Friends United Meeting. I'm made up of Quaker yearly meetings all around the world. We meet every three years for Triennials. Not only do we handle the business and organization of Quakers around the world, but we also do mission work and give material relief to lots of different countries. (FUM forms outside circle around YM)

All: And we are each represented in each one of these circles!

American Friends Service Committee — The American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) is a channel for service in a wide range of humanitarian activities at home and abroad through which many Friends in Friends United Meeting may express their convictions in relief and service. Its membership includes representatives of many of the constituent yearly meetings of Friends United Meeting.

Friends Committee on National Legislation — The Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL), with headquarters in Washington D.C., seeks to relate Friends principles to current national policy. Through meetings and literature, the FCNL informs Friends on matters pertinent to Friends beliefs and provides a channel of action. It seeks to work with legislators and administrative officers for those laws which will help make a peaceful world. The General Committee of the FCNL is made up of Friends United Meeting Friends, many representing constituent yearly meetings of Friends

Friends World Committee for Consultation — The Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC) has headquarters in London, England, and other offices around the world. The committee seeks to nurture the spiritual life and growth of the worldwide community of Friends through literature, conferences, intervisitation, and outreach. It is composed of representatives from yearly meetings around the world. Its purpose is to strengthen in Friends the sense of unity and interdependence and to enable Friends to take their place in the development of a Christian world community.
